

# St. Kevin's National School/S.N. Chaoimhín Naofa Anti-bullying policy

- 1. In accordance with the requirements of the Education (Welfare) Act 2000 and the code of behaviour guidelines issued by the NEWB, the Board of Management of St. Kevin's NS/S.N. Chaoimhín Naofa has adopted the following anti-bullying policy within the framework of the school's overall code of behaviour. This policy fully complies with the requirements of the *Anti-Bullying Procedures for Primary and Post-Primary Schools* which were published in September 2013.
- 2. The Board of Management recognises the very serious nature of bullying and the negative impact that it can have on the lives of pupils and is therefore fully committed to the following key principles of best practice in preventing and tackling bullying behaviour:
  - A positive school culture and climate which
    - o is welcoming of difference and diversity and is based on inclusivity;
    - encourages pupils to disclose and discuss incidents of bullying behaviour in a non-threatening environment; and
    - o promotes respectful relationships across the school community;
  - Effective leadership;
  - A school-wide approach;
  - A shared understanding of what bullying is and its impact;
  - Implementation of education and prevention strategies (including awareness raising measures) that
    - o build empathy, respect and resilience in pupils; and
    - explicitly address the issues of cyber-bullying and identity-based bullying including in particular, homophobic and transphobic bullying.
  - Effective supervision and monitoring of pupils;
  - Supports for staff;
  - Consistent recording, investigation and follow up of bullying behaviour (including use of established intervention strategies); and
  - On-going evaluation of the effectiveness of the anti-bullying policy.

3. In accordance with the *Anti-Bullying Procedures for Primary and Post-Primary Schools* bullying is defined as follows:

Bullying is unwanted negative behaviour, verbal, psychological or physical conducted, by an individual or group against another person (or persons) and which is repeated over time.

The following types of bullying behaviour are included in the definition of bullying:

- deliberate exclusion, malicious gossip and other forms of relational bullying,
- cyber-bullying and
- identity-based bullying such as homophobic bullying, racist bullying, bullying based on a person's membership of the Traveller community and bullying of those with disabilities or special educational needs.

Isolated or once-off incidents of intentional negative behaviour, including a once-off offensive or hurtful text message or other private messaging, do not fall within the definition of bullying and should be dealt with, as appropriate, in accordance with the school's code of behaviour.

However, in the context of this policy, placing a once-off offensive or hurtful public message, image or statement on a social network site or other public forum where that message, image or statement can be viewed and/or repeated by other people will be regarded as bullying behaviour.

Negative behaviour that does not meet this definition of bullying will be dealt with in accordance with the school's code of behaviour.

Additional information on different types of bullying is set out in Section 2 of the *Anti-Bullying Procedures for Primary and Post-Primary Schools*.

- 4. The relevant teacher(s) for investigating and dealing with bullying is (are) as follows: (see Section 6.8 of the Anti-Bullying Procedures for Primary and Post-Primary Schools): All teaching staff in St. Kevin's NS/S.N. Chaoimhín Naofa
- 5. The education and prevention strategies (including strategies specifically aimed at cyber- bullying and identity-based bullying including in particular, homophobic and transphobic bullying) that will be used by the school are as follows (see Section 6.5 of the Anti-Bullying Procedures for Primary and Post-Primary Schools):

### School-wide approach

- A school-wide approach to the fostering of respect for all members of the school community.
- The promotion of the value of diversity to address issues of prejudice and stereotyping, and highlight the unacceptability of bullying behaviour.
- The fostering and enhancing of the self-esteem of all our pupils through both curricular and extracurricular activities. Pupils will be provided with opportunities to develop a positive sense of self-worth through formal and informal interactions.
- Whole staff professional development on bullying to ensure that all staff develop an awareness of what bullying is, how it impacts on pupils' lives and the need to respond to it prevention and intervention.
- Professional development with specific focus on the training of the relevant teachers
- School-wide awareness raising on all aspects of bullying, to include pupils, parents/guardians and the wider school community.
- Supervision and monitoring of classrooms, corridors, school grounds, school tours and extra-curricular activities. Non-teaching and ancillary staff will be encouraged to be vigilant and report issues to relevant teachers. Supervision will also apply to monitoring student use of communication technology within the school.
- The school's Anti-Bullying policy is communicated to all parents and pupils via the school website. Likewise, all parents/guardians are given a copy of the Code of Behaviour on enrolment.
- Encourage a culture of telling, with particular emphasis on the importance of bystanders. In that way, pupils will gain confidence in 'telling'. This confidence factor is of vital importance. It should be made clear to all pupils that when they report incidents of bullying, they are not considered to be telling tales but are behaving responsibly.

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- Ensuring that pupils know who to tell and how to tell, e.g.:
  - o Direct approach to teacher at an appropriate time, for example, after class.
  - Hand note up with homework
  - Make a phone call to the school
  - o Get a parent/guardian to tell on your behalf
  - Ensure bystanders understand the importance of telling if they witness or know that bullying is taking place
  - School operates an open door and inclusive culture and this forms the basis by which parents/guardians can approach the school if they suspect that their child is being bullied.
- The Acceptable Use Policy in the school includes the necessary steps to esure that the access to technology within the school is strictly monitored.
- No mobile phones are allowed in the school.

### Implementation of curricula

The full implementation of the SPHE curriculum, to include the Stay Safe and RSE Programmes.

- Continuous Professional Development for staff in delivering these programmes.
- The school has a list of every resource related to the SPHE curriculum.
- Delivery of the Garda SPHE Programmes at primary level is deemed necessary. These lessons, delivered by Community Gardaí, cover issues around personal safety and cyber-bullying.
- The school will specifically consider the additional needs of pupils with Special Educational needs with regard to programme implementation and the development of skills and strategies to enable all pupils to respond appropriately.

- 6. The school's procedures for investigation, follow-up and recording of bullying behaviour and the established intervention strategies used by the school for dealing with cases of bullying behaviour are as follows (based on section 6.8 of the *Anti-Bullying Procedures for Primary and Post-Primary Schools*):
  - A pupil or parent may bring a bullying concern to any teacher in the school.
     Individual teachers must take appropriate measures regarding reports of bullying behaviour in accordance with the school's anti-bullying policy.
  - The member of teaching staff who has responsibility for investigating and dealing with bullying is referred to as the "relevant teacher". At primary level, the relevant teacher will normally be the class teacher.
  - The primary aim for the relevant teacher in investigating and dealing with bullying is to resolve any issues and to restore, as far as is practicable, the relationships of the parties involved (rather than to apportion blame);
  - In investigating and dealing with bullying, the teacher will exercise his/her
    professional judgement to determine whether bullying has occurred and how
    best the situation might be resolved;
  - All reports, including anonymous reports of bullying must be investigated and
    dealt with by the relevant teacher. In that way pupils will gain confidence in
    'telling'. This confidence factor is of vital importance. It should be made clear to
    all pupils that when they report incidents of bullying they are not considered to
    be telling tales but are behaving responsibly;
  - Non-teaching staff such as secretaries, special needs assistants (SNAs),
     caretakers, cleaners are encouraged to report any incidents of bullying
     behaviour witnessed by them, or mentioned to them, to the relevant teacher;
  - Parents and pupils are required to co-operate with any investigation and assist
    the school in resolving any issues and restoring, as far as is practicable, the
    relationships of the parties involved as quickly as possible;
  - It is very important that all involved (including each set of pupils and parents) understand the above approach from the outset;

- Teachers will take a calm, unemotional problem-solving approach when dealing with incidents of alleged bullying behaviour reported by pupils, staff or parents;
- Incidents are generally best investigated outside the classroom situation to ensure the privacy of all involved;
- All interviews will be conducted with sensitivity and with due regard to the rights
  of all pupils concerned. Pupils who are not directly involved can also provide very
  useful information in this way;
- When analysing incidents of bullying behaviour, the relevant teacher will seek
  answers to questions of what, where, when, who and why. This will be done in a
  calm manner, setting an example in dealing effectively with a conflict in a nonaggressive manner;
- If a group is involved, each member will be interviewed individually at first.

  Thereafter, all those involved will be met as a group. At the group meeting, each member will be asked for his/her account of what happened to ensure that everyone in the group is clear about each other's statements;
- Each member of a group will be supported through the possible pressures that they may face them from the other members of the group after interview by the teacher;
- It may also be appropriate or helpful to ask those involved to write down their account of the incident(s);
- In cases where it has been determined by the relevant teacher that bullying behaviour has occurred, the parents of the parties involved will be contacted at an early stage to inform them of the matter and explain the actions being taken (by reference to the school policy). The school will give parents an opportunity of discussing ways in which they can reinforce or support the actions being taken by the school and the supports for their pupils;
- Where the relevant teacher has determined that a pupil has been engaged in bullying behaviour, it will be made clear to him/her how he/she is in breach of the school's anti-bullying policy and efforts will be made to try to get him/her to see the situation from the perspective of the pupil being bullied;
- It must also be made clear to all involved (each set of pupils and parents) that in any situation where disciplinary sanctions are required, this is a private matter between the pupil being disciplined, his or her parents and the school;
- Follow-up meetings with the relevant parties involved will be arranged separately with a view to possibly bringing them together at a later date if the pupil who has been bullied is ready and agreeable. This can have a therapeutic effect;

- In cases where the relevant teacher considers that the bullying behaviour has not been adequately and appropriately addressed within 20 school days after he/she has determined that bullying behaviour has occurred, it must be recorded by the relevant teacher in the recording template at Appendix 3 of the Anti-Bullying Procedures for Primary and Post-Primary Schools;
- In determining whether a bullying case has been adequately and appropriately addressed the relevant teacher must, as part of his/her professional judgement, take the following factors into account:
  - Whether the bullying behaviour has ceased;
  - Whether any issues between the parties have been resolved as far as is practicable;
  - Whether the relationships between the parties have been restored as far as is practicable; and
  - Any feedback received from the parties involved, their parents or the school Principal or Deputy Principal;
- Where a parent is not satisfied that the school has dealt with a bullying case in accordance with these procedures, the parents must be referred, as appropriate, to the school's complaints procedures;
- In the event that a parent has exhausted the school's complaints procedures and is still not satisfied, the school must advise the parents of their right to make a complaint to the Ombudsman for Children.

### Procedures for recording bullying behaviour

The Board of Management will ensure that the school has clear procedures for the formal noting and reporting of bullying behaviour and these must be documented in the school's anti-bullying policy. All records must be maintained in accordance with relevant data protection legislation. The school's procedures for noting and reporting bullying behaviour must adhere to the following:

- While all reports, including anonymous reports of bullying must be investigated and dealt with by the relevant teacher, the relevant teacher will use his/her professional judgement in relation to the records to be kept of these reports, the actions taken and any discussions with those involved regarding same;
- If it is established by the relevant teacher that bullying has occurred, the relevant teacher must keep appropriate written records which will assist his/her efforts to resolve the issues and restore, as far as is practicable, the relationships of the parties involved.

- The relevant teacher must use the recording template at Appendix 3 of the *Anti-Bullying Procedures for Primary and Post-Primary Schools* to record the bullying behaviour in the following circumstances:
  - a) in cases where he/she considers that the bullying behaviour has not been adequately and appropriately addressed within 20 school days after he/she has determined that bullying behaviour occurred; and
  - b) where the school has decided as part of its anti-bullying policy that in certain circumstances bullying behaviour must be recorded and reported immediately to the Principal or Deputy Principal as applicable.
- In each of the circumstances at (a) and (b) above, the recording template at Appendix 3 of the *Anti-Bullying Procedures for Primary and Post-Primary Schools* must be completed in full and retained by the teacher in question and a copy provided to the Principal or Deputy Principal as applicable. It should also be noted that the timeline for recording bullying behaviour in the recording template at Appendix 3 does not in any way preclude the relevant teacher from consulting the Principal or Deputy Principal at an earlier stage in relation to a case.

# 7. Programme of Support for pupils affected by bullying

The school's programme of support for working with pupils affected by bullying is as follows (Section 6.8 of the *Anti-Bullying Procedures for Primary and Post-Primary Schools*):

- All in-school supports and opportunities will be provided for the pupils affected by bullying to participate in activities designed to raise their self-esteem, to develop friendships and social skills and build resilience e.g.
  - SPHE lessons
  - Stay Safe programme
  - Walk Talk
  - o NEPS programmes on <a href="https://www.neps.ie">www.neps.ie</a>
  - Buddy bench
  - Support teaching including Social Skills Group
  - o Group work such as Circle Time
- If pupils require counselling or further supports, the school will endeavour to liaise with the appropriate agencies to organise same. In very serious cases, NEPS will also be contacted for advice.
- Pupils should understand that there are no innocent bystanders and that all incidents of bullying behaviour must be reported to a teacher.

8. Supervision and Monitoring of Pupils

The Board of Management confirms that appropriate supervision and monitoring policies

and practices are in place to both prevent and deal with bullying behaviour and to

facilitate early intervention where possible.

9. Prevention of Harassment

The Board of Management confirms that the school will, in accordance with its obligations

under equality legislation, take all such steps that are reasonably practicable to prevent

the sexual harassment of pupils or staff or the harassment of pupils or staff on any of

the nine grounds specified i.e. gender including transgender, civil status, family status,

sexual orientation, religion, age, disability, race and membership of the Traveller

community.

10. This policy was adopted by the Board of Management on 6th December 2021.

11. This policy has been made available to school personnel, published on the school website

and provided to the Parents' Association. A copy of this policy will be made available to

the Department and the patron if requested.

12. This policy and its implementation will be reviewed by the Board of Management once

in every school year. Written notification that the review has been completed will be

made available to the school community, via the school website. A record of the review

and its outcome will be made available, if requested, to the patron and the Department.
